VALE ROBERT WILLIAN WEST


(5 September 1928 – 4 June 2024)

GERMAN KRUPP GUN



Our museum records show that a 75-millimetre German Krupp field gun was captured by the 11th Light Horse Regiment at Galilee in September 1918 and brought back to Australia.

It was unveiled by Governor Sir Matthew Nathan on 4th August 1923 on the cliff top adjacent to Signal Row, Shorncliffe.

Sometime later it was taken from Shorncliffe to New Farm Park and mounted there without its wheels.

In 1982 the Lions Club of Sandgate placed a cairn at the cliff top location, showing the directions to prominent geographical features.

The gun has since been restored and is now on display at the Light Horse Museum at Gallipoli Barracks, Enoggera.

CABBAGE TREE HATS

Do you know of anyone who owns a cabbage-tree hat, or do you have any information on local manufacture of these hats?



Traditional hats made from palm trees, Cabbage tree hats were made as far back as 1799 and were still being worn at the end of the 19th century by bush workers and farmers in parts of New South Wales and Queensland.

The hats, woven from narrow strips of cabbage tree palm were light, and stood up to hard wear. They cost up to £3, depending on quality. Many country women were expert hat-makers.

The long narrow leaves of the palm were soaked in hot water for a few minutes and partly dried. Each leaf was then shredded with a hand shredder, the teeth of which were set about 1/8 inch apart for fine grade hats, and 3/16 inch for coarser hats. The strands were plaited by hand into suitable lengths for working and rolled up on an oval spool until required. Four of the broader strands were used for the cheaper hat and six of the finer strands for the better hat. The flat plaited strips of cabbage leaf were worked round and round and stitched through by hand with stitches about 1/4 inch apart.

Sometimes a basin was used to shape the crown. The finished hat was lined throughout with a strong red or green material.

THE SANDGATE DRILL HALL

The building was always referred to as the "new Drill Hall".

At a meeting in April 1900 during the Boer War, Captain Clatworthy advised that B Company, Moreton Regiment had its headquarters at Sandgate. Development of recruitment and military training in the Sandgate area was advocated. The troops were under the control of the Queensland Defence Force.

Tenders for the erection and completion of the new Drill Hall, offices and fencing were called for in February 1915.

At the completion of the work, Mr Alder, Inspector of Works, reported in early December 1915, "the grounds immediately surrounding the Sandgate Drill Hall are very low and flat, and for some time after rain, the water lies. Nearly the whole of the recently acquired land is much below the rest of the reserve, Water lies in places to a depth of 10 to 12 inches. The whole of the enclosure needs filling in places, levelling and grading with about 300 cubic yards of soil and draining at an estimated cost of 40 pounds." This report was submitted to the department of Home Affairs early January 1916. An order came from the Federal Department, No 3B, authorising the levelling and draining of the grounds.

At the end of the month, Inspector Alder again advised his department that, with respect to a balance of money left over from the construction work of the Hall that this balance be kept in reserve for further adjustment after the filling had been allowed to settle, since it was 12 to 15 inches deep in the low-lying areas. Approval was granted in June 1916.

The Drill Hall was used for many purposes during the recruitment and training of men for the First World War. An adjunct on the northern end towards Hancock Street was a small-bore rifle range for practice purposes by troops associated with the Hall's existence. The .310 Cadet single shot rifle was used in the early part of the century for drill purposes.

The Hall was utilised for other activities during the years like Sandgate State School Balls, roller skating etc.

As early as 1960, when National Service Training concluded, concern was expressed about the future of the Drill Hall.

Members of the Apex Club and Lions Club made overtures towards gaining possession of the Drill Hall should it not be required by the Army. It was envisaged using the hall as a Youth and Community Centre. The clubs were advised that the hall was not available at that time.

However, in 1969, it was announced that the Army planned to increase its Citizen Military Forces quota and invited local recruits to attend parades each Tuesday evening.

In 1993, rumours began to circulate about the possible sale of the Army Reserve Depot in Bowser Parade. Alderman Murray was quoted as saying the residents of Sandgate would welcome the move as it would allow the future development of the Sandgate Shopping Centre Zone.

In February 1996, soldiers of the 9th Battalion, Royal Queensland Army Reserve held an open training day at the barracks.

Early in 1999, Mr Pat O'Keefe, of the 9th Battalion Trustees, fearing the possible demolition of the building, applied to have it heritage listed.

Despite much public lobbying to retain the Drill Hall at Sandgate, plans were made to remove the building to a site in 7th Brigade Park, Chermside where it would become a part of the historical precinct and house a museum of army memorabilia.

The former Sandgate Drill Hall building maintains its military links as it is the location of the 'Milne Bay Memorial Library and Research Centre' that was established by the 9th Battalions War Memorial Museum Collection and Property Trust.

MUSEUM UPDATE

Significance Assessment Report

The museum has applied for a grant from the National Library of Australia to employ an expert to train volunteers in the organisation, digitisation and cataloguing of the wealth of historical records contained in our filing cabinets – we are eagerly awaiting the outcome.

A number of grant applications have been submitted and others are being prepared. Once again, we hope for positive outcomes.

VALE BERTRAM JAMES MIDGLEY



Sandgate Historical Society Life Member, Mr Bertram (Bert) James Midgley passed away on 1st July 2024, at Cardwell. Bert was born in 1929 and was a long-term resident of Sandgate. For many years he lived with his family in a house he

built in Best Street, Brighton. His house was a treasure trove of tools, maps, sailing gear, awards and photographs of his family and caravan travels.

A gentleman and a family man, with his wife Norma he had three sons and one daughter. Norma passed away twenty years ago. He was a good husband, although almost certainly at times a handful. When married, for their honeymoon Bert took Norma, and they hiked the full length of Moreton Island!

Bert enjoyed good health well into his later years, enabling him to maintain an active involvement in the community. He took great pride in the maintenance of his house and yard.

In September 2020 Bert had a cerebral haemorrhage. After a two week stay in hospital where he enjoyed the meals and the care from staff he returned home to Brighton. However, he needed increasing assistance and in early 2021 Bert went to live with his son, Andrew on Magnetic Island. Needing more care, Bert then went to live out his remaining years at Rockingham Aged Care, Cardwell.

As a boy Bert grew up in Sandgate. With a thirst for adventure and exploring he criss-crossed the streets, paddocks, bushland and waterways of the district. He tells stories about his life and that of Sandgate in the two short movies available on the museum's website - *Bay of Lights (2018) and Voices from the Past* produced by the museum and Abintra Creations in 2021/22.

One of his stories relates to an incident during World War 2 on the bay foreshore near Eventide. An American bomber had made a forced landing and then after patching up and reducing weight, the aircraft just managed to take off...being watched avidly by young Bert. Around the same time, while "wagging school" to go fishing on the Shorncliffe Pier he witnessed an American Airacobra fighter crash into Bramble Bay.

In the 1950's Bert was a member and leader at the Sandgate and Brighton Scouts. His scouting days included leading a group of Rover Scouts up Mount Tibrogargan, in the Glass House Mountains where his group found the remains of a missing hiker.

He was also a keen and competitive dinghy sailor and regularly raced in the bay from the Sandgate Yacht Club in Cabbage Tree Creek. As typical of Bert he knew how to build things and fix them. He was accomplished in using boat rigger's and sail maker's tools and materials.

In early 2020, coinciding with the start of the Brisbane to Gladstone Yacht race there were plans to have a boating display at the Sandgate Museum. Bert had offered to give demonstrations to "yachty" visitors on the traditional use of tools for sail making and rigging. Unfortunately, that never eventuated as Covid19 caused cancellation of the yacht race and temporary closure of the museum and many public places across the city and beyond.

Bert was an active member and volunteer for the Sandgate Museum. He was a legend at selling raffle tickets, always selling more than anyone else. During his time, he was a dedicated member and supporter of the museum's management committee and was appointed a Life Member for his contributions.

Bert loved Sandgate and loved life. He expressed his feelings and humour in the following poem, penned as a teenager around 1940.

IN OUR BOROUGH BY THE BAY - By Bert Midgley

Where the people live down by the sea,
The people they work with a will all day long.
And at night they're so happy and free!
In our town by the bay.

We are proud of our arts and our sports,
We have fields, we have baths,
And pictures and courses and courts.
We've planes that have motors,
And others that glide.

And if you play marbles we are sure to oblige,
In our town by the bay.
In our town by the bay,

We have girls with beauty to spare. They're dimples so rosy and fair,

They rate with film stars of that have no fear!
They're better than film stars 'cos our girls live here on the shore.

In our town by the bay,
The boats can be seen at weekends.
Sailing round off the shore,
As you sit and you watch with a friend.
Your girlfriend will say "What a beautiful sight!"
But she can't hear the crews swear with all of their might

On our shores by the bay, Where the people live down by the sea.
